Course Mission:

Western Civilization is an academically challenging content rich course that is coordinated in many areas with the Jefferson Academy literature program. This course serves as the foundation for future social studies courses in both high school and college. Throughout the semester, this course will provide a balanced look at the humanities by exploring the history, geography, civics, and economic aspects of modern world societal development. Challenging assignments that involve reading, analysis, synthesis, writing, public speaking, simulations, Socratic seminars, and groups will be used to track these developments. Lecture, discussion, art, music and video technology will also be used to enhance the learning.

Course policies and procedures:

- You should be to class daily and on time. I will enforce the absent and late policies outlined for you in the JA student handbook
- 2. Students may have closed drink containers and light snacks. The ability to have this policy is directly related to the ability of students to throw trash away and keep food or drink off of the floor.
- 3. Students are only permitted to use personal electronic devices in the classroom on a limited basis. Mobile phones will be stored in the 'phone jail' on the wall. If a student chooses to use electronic devices during times when it is not allowed, the device may be confiscated following the procedures outlined in the student handbook. For the first confiscation, I will simply have a word with you and give the phone back after class. For the second confiscation, I will take the phone to the office for the remainder of the day. For subsequent confiscations, you will be assigned to Friday school and additional consequences may be assigned by administration.
- 4. Make up work for those serving a suspension will follow JA policy on suspended students.
- 5. Academic honesty and integrity is central to the JA course of study. There is a ZERO tolerance policy for those that engage in academic dishonesty. Cheating, copying, or plagiarizing will result in a zero for that assignment. When writing or doing projects, it is important to attribute all ideas, words or thoughts of another, to that person. JA and district policies apply in all cases of plagiarism.
- 6. Respect for others ideas and items are paramount to a safe learning environment. All communication should be honoring and respectful. There is to be no hazing, no unwanted communication or harassing, and no touching things that don't belong to you as per JA and district policy.
- 7. All work and presentations should be turned in on time and done to the best of your ability. As a rule, I do not accept late work unless the student has <u>pre-cleared the reason for the late assignment</u>. As a J.A. student, it is paramount that you begin to submit things in a timely manner. When this isn't possible, communication is essential if you hope to have the assignment accepted.

Grading

Grades in this class are determined on a weighted basis. The categories and weights attached to them are as follows:

- Homework, class work 35%
- Tests, guizzes, assessments and projects 35%
- Essays and writing assignments 20%
- Final exam 7%
- Serving in the Community 3% One of the themes that we will be focusing on in our studies is the effect of civic engagement on a society. Social studies students at Jefferson Academy are to take partial responsibility for the quality of their school by participating in the things going on at it. Students are therefore required to attend at least five school events during the fall semester. This requirement is lowered to three if they are playing a sport or involved in a school club outside of the regular school day. School things to be involved in or whose events are attendable include but are not limited to sporting events, dances, art shows, drama productions, and board meetings. Other activities will be considered if mentioned to the instructor.

Students should monitor their own grades continually as they will be updated regularly. The grading scale is as follows:
A = 90 - 100% $B = 80 - 89%$ $C = 70 - 79%$ $D = 60 - 69%Although this is a fairly standard scale, I have built in ways to assess performance that can enhance the grading$
scale. Students that participate in class and discussions and work hard will never fail regardless of percentage.
Homework Policy All homework is to be turned in on the assigned date. Late work will not be accepted. Students that have excused absences will be subject to school rules for the makeup of their work (2 days for each excused absence). Makeup work for unexcused absences will be allowed, but will be penalized one letter grade from the grade earned. It is also monumentally important that in this class, students pre-read and continue to keep up or
reading prior to assigned tasks. By following the basic topic calendar that follows, all students should generally know what is expected and what needs to be read.
